The United States Constitution is the Supreme Law of the Land, deriving ~~their~~^{its} power from the people of the United States.

Supreme power and Supreme law differ from each other in that the Supreme Power Comes from the people through which they create and consent to the Supreme law, which are rules that are created to protect the rights of **EVERYONE**, every ~~one~~ persons freedom.

That is why it is so important to protect these basic human rights for prisoners who are incarcerated throughout the United States, **MILLIONS** of human beings who are often reduced to a prison number.

I have become a jailhouse lawyer in my over a decade of serving a life sentence ~~for~~ for 2nd degree murder, my first and only felony. I have seen more and more, how the plain meanings in the Supreme Law of the Land, the United States Constitution with its Bill of Rights be interpreted by various people and prison administrations to ~~not~~ **NOT** protect prisoners constitutional legal rights, but find ways around it.

I see this on-going on a daily basis when I try to exercise my Constitutional rights and the draconian practices and intimidation that results.

The GTL tablets at this prison are monitored by any prison staff and some inmates. When I exercise my free speech guaranteed by the First Amendment on the tablets when I text or make phone calls, I am ~~also~~ immediately labeled and a ~~also~~ campaign of intimidation occurs against me by both prison staff and inmates who are their minions to do their bidding. The same thing occurs with my mail.

I tried to send a 1983 violations of civil rights legal complaint to federal court (protected under the First Amendment Access to Court) and have had difficulties in sending the legal mail. The prison staff appear hostile towards me for exercising this constitutional right and are more than happy to encourage their inmate pet minions to intimidate me to stop my exercise of constitutional rights in a court of law.

The prison mailroom and prison administration has not allowed me to receive 3 Buddhist magazines in a row. This is protected under the First Amendment of freedom of the press and freedom of religion, but the prison staff interpret things anyway they want.

Everyday, the Constitution, and the rights of its citizens languishing away in prisons that it guarantees as rights to every American citizen is being interpreted away or just plain ignored. It is up to the American people, "We the People..." to make sure the U.S.

Constitution, the Supreme Law of the land is applied to everyone, especially prisoners who need it most.
