

New Improved Duress (Beyond Repulsive)

The Ohio Justice and Policy Center (OJPC) have stooped to new lows as it pertains to pressuring criminal defendants, or those already convicted, to claim guilt even if ~~when~~ they are in fact innocent. Cop-outs achieved by way of scare tactics in which a defendant is told they'll do a lot of time if they go to trial is no longer viable in-and-of-itself. Lawyers have resorted to tricks of a new breed.

The OJPC is now saying if you're incarcerated they can help you get out of prison if you ~~sweat~~ to admit guilt. In a screening application the OJPC have made available to Ohio inmates (application is attached to this piece) they aver: "Beyond Guilt [which is the name of this particular OJPC project] is seeking to free people who admit guilt... If you are claiming that you innocent on all charges for what you were convicted, we will not be able to represent you."

There's no guarantee anything will actually be done to secure one's release, but those who take the bait will be on the record admitting guilt to an entity intricately tied to Ohio judicial bodies.

Obviously this project is directed at those whom went to trial. Hence if an incarcerated individual takes up OJPC on their offer, prosecutors, defense ~~attorneys~~ attorneys, judges, and other persons of judicial authority, including those of higher echelons of the judicial process (appeals courts, federal level courts, etc.) will spontaneously be let off the hook for all or most aspects of their transgressions — that is, lying, misusing evidence, constitutional violations, etc..

Notice the claim of being unable to help it one profess innocence. This is to liberally interpret: say you're guilty or else. It also implies criminal justice personnel apprehension due the pain and troubles they've caused in their repulsive doings, though in loose terms. More than that, it further underscores criminal justice personnel is conscious of their blunders and apathy resulting in the incarceration of persons whom committed no crimes and for the incarceration of people who could not have been convicted but for being overcharged.

Said personnel, however, are so far removed from utilitarianism and rational, though one can argue that if they were high on these attributes they would've never been granted a license to practice law, that they believe if they can convince the imprisoned to admit guilt, then the finger pointed at them for their foul doings is pivoted to the incarcerated. Through these undertaking prosecutors and persons of other criminal justice entities will always be able to assert: he/she admitted guilt. Therefore there's never a question of practices of judicial wrongs — this is what they assume the bottom-line will be... they're mistaken.

It's no wonder why so many taxpaying people are at least on the fringe of contemplating overthrowing the government; many are otherwise silently supportive of such. Many call for realistic forms of "protesting", including swarming the front lawns of lawmakers, judges, prosecutors, etc.. And mindsets as such oughtn't be taken lightly as history has taught the people, whom far outnumber political figures, are more than capable of stirring catastrophic turmoil even if they only posit ~~corruption~~ corruption permeates prominent judicial/political bodies.

The people are fed up with government entities' assuredness in cruelty maneuvering resulting in widespread rancor. One thinks for sure, you'll never catch this innocent man, Ennis R. Tetterson, claiming he's guilty of crimes

which never occurred; and you'll never catch me ceasing in my quest to expose corruption of the American criminal justice system in Ohio — specifically those of judicial authority whom who involved with my case.
